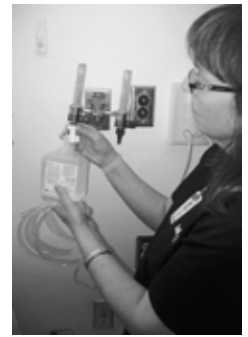
## *Hospital Respiratory Tools*



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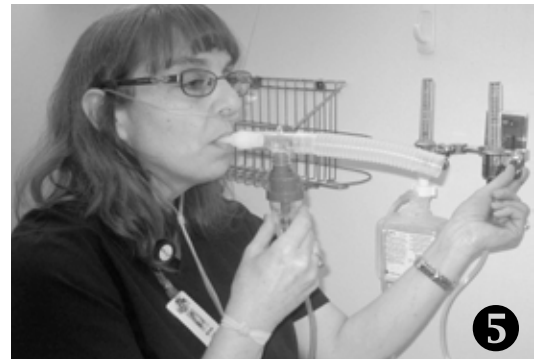


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1 **Hopkins Pulse Oximeter** -- Attaches to a fingertip and senses the amount of oxygen carried in the body (a reading of 95% is normal). 2 **Oxygen Flow Meter** -- Patients with a reading of 90% or less receive oxygen from one of two wall-mounted flow meters in every patient room. 3 **Chemtron Sterile Water** -- To keep nasal passages from drying out, a bubble humidifier is attached to the flowmeter.

4 **Nasal Cannula** -- is a flexible tube that carries oxygen from the flowmeter to the nose. The tube has two prongs that go inside the nostrils. 5 **Inhalation Therapy** -- The second flow meter is available to supply oxygen, like a nebulizer, for the administration of medicated breathing treatments, as shown by Michele Lively, Registered Respiratory Therapist.
